CELEBRATING OUR FORTIETH.... and the future

Members will be aware that an essential part of our existence as an Association of the National Trust is to raise funds for its projects. This year, in celebration of our anniversary we discussed a wide range of appeals, we were looking for special places where our members could visit and appreciate the result of your support, and finally decided on those listed below.

Croome Park The National Trust owns a strip of land situated to the north of Croome, Pirton Ridge, in the centre of which sits Pirton Castle. The castle was designed by James Wyatt in 1801 and is one of Croome's three outer eye-catchers. On the ridge at Pirton are a number of mature cedars which were planted in the eighteenth century. Our £1,000 provides 12 young trees and tree guards which will replace the older trees in the years to come.

Still on the subject of trees, we also donated the sum of £500 to **Packwood House** for the sponsorship of four fruit trees to be planted in the Kitchen Garden. The four trees are (1) apple, "Golden Pippin" (2) pear "Beurre Superfin" (3) apple "Blenheim Orange" and (4) pear "Black Worcester". Their positions are marked on the plan,(see back page) and at the rear of each fruit tree label will be marked "MWA" so that visiting members can identify 'our' trees!

£500 also went to **Farnborough Hall** towards the conservation and repainting of the ornamental plasterwork on the domed ceiling and walls of the delightful 'prospect room' in the Oval Pavilion. It was hoped to have the Oval Temple completed and opened to the public this summer. (See picture on front cover)

Not trees but a 'tree house'! **Moseley Old Hall** in Staffordshire has acquired an additional area of woodland, which they propose to develop as a Family Area, with children's games, a picnic space and a tree house, our £500 donation will cover most or possibly all of the cost of the tree house.

Last but not least - Our 40th anniversary supper will be on 4th October in the Orangery at **Charlecote Park**, on that occasion we shall also be presenting a donation to cover one of their projects - more news and pictures in the Spring 2013 Issue of 'Oak Leaves'

TUESDAY 23rd APRIL 2013

THE GEFFRYE MUSEUM and THE MUSEUM of CHILDHOOD

These two London museums offer a contrast of interests. First we make our way to the Geffrye Museum, which specializes in the history of the English domestic interior. It is housed in the Grade I listed almshouses built in 1714 and shows the changing style of the interiors in a series of displayed period rooms from 1600 to the present day. The emphasis is on the furnishings, pictures and ornaments of the urban middle classes of London. In addition there is an eighteenth century alms house as part of the display, showing the building in its original guise as a rest home for the poor. Lunch has been booked for us in the Museum Café, which is at the back of the Almshouses, and looks out to the pretty gardens and over the new Hoxton station.

After lunch, at about 2.30pm, we go by coach to the V & A Museum of Childhood in Bethnal Green which houses the UK's National Collection of childhood objects, ranging in date from the 1600s to the present day. As well as toys, dolls, dolls houses, games and puzzles the Museum also has a wealth of objects relating to many other aspects of childhood, including home and childcare, play and learning, clothing, representations of childhood, archival collections and ephemera. Tea cakes and pastries are available (not included in the price) in the Benugo Café on site, before we leave for home.

THURSDAY 16th MAY 2013

**BIDDULPH GRANGE GARDENS and
JODRELL BANK OBSERVATORY**

We leave Leamington and drive through the historic area of the Potteries and Ceramic industry, after which we run through a string of coalmining villages, one of the most deprived areas where the scars of its industrial heritage still show. Shortly before we reach Biddulph Grange we have a good view of the Mow Cap mining village, parts of which were gifted to the National Trust in 1937, and where the mining of coal and millstones were first recorded in 1307.

The main attraction of Biddulph Grange are the amazing gardens laid out in 1880 by James Bateman, a contemporary of Charles Darwin, who shared his beliefs and scientific interests. The gardens were laid out to amaze, educate and entertain, and the various themes lead you on a fantasy global journey. There are several sets of moderate steps. Light refreshments and lunches are available.

At approximately 1.15 we shall depart for the 35 minute drive through the Cheshire parkland to Jodrell Bank. Jodrell Bank Discovery Centre, built in the 1950s, has always been at the forefront of radio astronomy, and it still maintains its reputation by reporting on new space research and space phenomena. In addition to the telescopes, there are many pavilions with displays for all levels of scientific knowledge, with special displays relating to space and the planets. For the keen gardener there are also 35 acres of gardens with over 2000 species of plants. There is also a comprehensive restaurant and cafeteria. We will leave for home at about 4pm.

TUESDAY 18th JUNE 2013

BOUGHTON HOUSE, NORTHANTS

Built in 1700, it was modelled on Versailles for the English Ambassador to France. The house has not changed in three centuries and contains a superb collection of paintings, tapestries, furniture and porcelain, which requires a guided tour. It is the private property of the Duke of Buccleuch and has restricted public opening. We will have it to ourselves.

Around the house there are acres of fine parkland including lawns, lakes, waterways and woods, some of which are 300 years old. The park is being restored to its former glory. There is also a walled kitchen garden with a large herbaceous border which should be in full bloom when we visit. Lunch in the Stable Restaurant has to be booked in advance though you may picnic in the garden. The lunch will be cold buffet with ham, chicken, salmon, a variety of salads and bread. It includes tea or coffee. The food is excellent. The cost of travel and the guided tour of the house, including coffee/tea on arrival with home-made biscuits will be £28.50, with an additional £10 for lunch.

While the beauty and tranquil atmosphere of Baddesley remain the same, some things have changed and the house, gardens and estate are now open all year round, with the exception of Christmas Day. Last year the restaurant fed 1,200 with Christmas lunches, and they had over 10,000 visiting in December and 6,000 in January. Winter opening times are 12 noon – 4pm, and the restaurant will be offering Christmas lunches again. The series of **Brunch Lectures** will be starting again on October 10th, every Wednesday and Thursday until 15th November. The cost is £15 for a one-hour lecture on a variety of topics, followed by a hearty English Breakfast. 9.30 to 11am. Booking essential.

Saturday 27th October, **Murder Mystery Evening**, from 6.30pm in the house, followed by a three-course dinner in the Barn Restaurant. £45 Booking essential.

This year Packwood is closing at the end of October, until then it will be open every day except Monday, 11am to 5pm. There will be no Christmas opening, to enable building work to take place – members will recall the appeals for support last year, and now they will be starting on a new centre, extended car parking, new restaurant and tea room and new Reception/Visitor Centre., they hope to have it all complete by Autumn 2013. Major conservation work has been undertaken in the house, and the installation of a water source heat pump in the lake. The garden team have been working hard in the kitchen garden and among others, planting 18 varieties of heritage potato!
