Visit to Wightwick Manor,

Tuesday 4th July 2023



A small group, after a number of late cancellations, went to Wightwick Manor on the western edge of Wolverhampton. Whilst the day was dull for much of the time, the forecast showers held off and the sun was out over lunchtime. The house is relatively modern being built in the late 19th century with the west wing being occupied in 1888 and the slightly later east wing from 1893. The house was built by the Manders family who built their wealth from their paints business in Wolverhampton.

The Manders were keen followers of the Arts and Crafts movement and this is seen throughout the house including William Morris wallcoverings and William de Morgan tiles.



The Great Parlour (pictured) is at the centre of the house in contrast to the more homely rooms elsewhere. Overall this felt like a grand family home.

The family were also keen collectors of pre-Raphaelite paintings which has been added to by the family and the National Trust following the Trust acquiring the house in 1937. Artists featuring in the house include John Roddam Spencer Stanhope, Lucy Maddox Brown, G F Watts and Burne-Jones. At the back of the house in the former Malthouse is a collection of artwork by Evelyn and William de Morgan.

Outside we were fortunate to visit just as fencing had gone up to allow scaffolding to be erected as part of a restoration programme over the next few years which will obscure at least part of the house. The grounds are not extensive by comparison with stately homes but nevertheless it has a formal garden , well stocked kitchen garden, lawns, two lakes and a woodland area. It was somewhat incongruous to have a quiet walk through the woodland only to realise that just over the boundary were modern houses!

Minutes of the Annual General Meeting of the Mid-Warwickshire Association of the National Trust, held at the Kingsley School, Leamington Spa, on 7th November 2022 at 7.30 p.m.

Opening Address – The Vice-President Mr Graham Cooper opened the meeting by saying that the Association was formed fifty years ago. The first meeting was held at the Spa Centre then moved to Leamington College in Binswood Avenue, then moved back to the Spa Centre as the membership grew. He also said that Committee Members and Volunteers were required.

Apology for Absence – Mr Norman Pratt.

Minutes of the AGM held on 4th November 2019 had been circulated. Their adoption was proposed by Mr Clive Nelson, seconded by Barbara Fowkes and unanimously agreed. There was no AGM in 2020 owing the coronavirus pandemic.

Treasurer's Report – The Treasurer Mrs Marianne Pitts submitted the Annual Accounts for the year ended August 2022. Also, the very welcome return of "live" meetings in Kingsley meant we had to pay more than £1,000 for room hire. As a result, our only modest donation was to Hidcote Gardens – some customised planters, with our name engraved on them.
